Pupil Premium Strategy

Silverdale St John's CE Primary School, in common with all other schools, receives its funding from the Government via Lancashire Local Authority.

One element of this funding is called the PUPIL PREMIUM. The amount of this additional funding varies from school to school and is dependent on 3 factors: the number of children in school who are in the care of the local authority, the number who have an entitlement to a free school meal and the number who have a parent(s) in the armed forces.

Provision

Our Pupil Premium grant is spent directly to benefit those children who it supports. This can include:

- Providing small group work with an experienced teaching assistant, focused on overcoming gaps in learning, nurture support or simply time to reflect.
- 1:1 support in class
- Acquiring effective materials aimed at raising standards, particularly in reading and mathematics.
- Additional teaching and learning opportunities outside the classroom such as funding for school trips and residential visits.

We would also consider using the pupil premium grant to aid in the financial cost of extracurricular activities such as music tuition and after school clubs, to further promote social, moral, spiritual and cultural development. The school would work closely with parents to ensure that this would directly benefit the individual child.

All our work through the pupil premium will be aimed at strengthening emotional wellbeing and accelerating progress, moving children to at least age related expectations.

- a) Continue to support learning in relevant classes by providing an extra adult to support group work in class
- b) Continuing to fund a learning mentor in school for 2 hrs per week to provide pastoral support to those children who need it.

c) Fund additional extra-curricular activities, school trips and residential visits.

The impact of the PPG for 2016/17 was:

a) Data below shows that all PP children made expected progress and some made better than expected progress.

- b) Children's opportunities for extra-curricular activities and the school residential were maximised, contributing to high levels of wellbeing and involvement in school life.
- c) Provision of a learning mentor allowed for specific children to talk through worries and concerns when they needed to. Children worked with the learning mentor on various activities outside the classroom, allowing them time to relax and talk to a 'safe' person when they needed to.
