

## WHOLE SCHOOL POLICY FOR SAFEGUARDING & CHILD PROTECTION

## SILVERDALE ST JOHN'S CE PRIMARY SCHOOL

The purpose of this safeguarding policy is to ensure every child who is a registered pupil at our school is safe and protected from harm. This means we will always work to:

- Protect children and young people at our school from maltreatment;
- Prevent impairment of our children's and young people's health or development;
- Ensure that children and young people at our school grow up in circumstances consistent with the provision of safe and effective care;
- Undertake that role so as to enable children at our school to have the best outcomes.

This policy will give clear direction to staff, volunteers, visitors and parents about expectations and our legal responsibility to safeguard and promote the welfare of all children at our school.

Our school fully recognises the contribution it can make to protect children from harm and to support and promote the welfare of all children who are registered pupils at our school.

This policy applies to all pupils, staff, parents, governors, volunteers and visitors.

This policy should be read in conjunction with the School's Safeguarding Portfolio.

Specific Safeguarding	Silverdale School is committed to keeping our children safe from specific forms of abuse. We therefore ensure that:
	ALL staff and volunteers understand that there are specific and emerging ways in which children can be abused, such as:
	<b><u>Radicalisation</u></b> refers to the process by which a person comes to support terrorism and forms of extremism, there is no single way of identifying an individual who is likely to be susceptible to an extremist ideology.
	<ul> <li>ALL staff and volunteers will have 'due regard to the need to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism' known as the 'Prevent Duty'</li> </ul>

<u>Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE)</u> involves exploitative situations, contexts and relationships where young people may receive something (e.g. food, accommodation, drugs, alcohol, gifts or simply affection) as a result of engaging in sexual activities. The perpetrator will not only groom the victim (possibly over a long period of time) but will always hold some kind of power which increases as the exploitative relationship develops. Sexual exploitation involves a degree of coercion, intimidation or enticement, including unwanted pressures from peers to have sex, sexual bullying including on line bullying (cyberbullying) and grooming. It is important to recognise that some young people who are being sexually exploited do not exhibit any external signs of this abuse.

- The school curriculum (whereby sexual relationships/PSHE is delivered) will include relevant information around the risks associated with CSE
- The school <u>Online Safety Policy</u> will ensure the safety of children by ensuring they cannot access inappropriate material when using the internet and that suitable filtering software is in place

<u>Honour Based Violence (HBV)</u> 'A crime or incident, which has or may have been committed, to protect or defend the honour of the family and/or community'. (ACPO Working Definition 2008) ALL staff and volunteers will have a general understanding of how to identify a child who may be at risk of Honour Based Violence.

**<u>Forced Marriage</u>** is one whereby one or both parties do not consent to marriage but are forced to do so through violence, threats or any form of coercion. Schools play an important role in safeguarding children from being forced to marry.

**Female Genital Mutilation (FGM)** is encompassed within the term Honour Based Violence

- ALL staff and volunteers are aware of the "one chance rule" and will report all cases of suspected Honour Based Violence to the DSL immediately
- FGM is illegal in the UK and a form of child abuse with long-lasting harmful consequences
- ALL staff need to be alert to the possibility of when a female pupil may be at risk of FGM or when it may have been conducted on them
- Whilst all staff should speak to the designated safeguarding lead (or deputy) with regard to any concerns about female genital mutilation (FGM), there is a specific **legal** duty on **teachers.** If a **teacher**, in the course of their work in the profession, discovers that an act of FGM appears to have been carried out on a girl under the age of 18, the teacher **must** report this to the police.

**Modern Slavery** The Modern Slavery Act 2015 places a new statutory duty on public authorities, including schools, to notify the National Crime Agency (NCA) (section 52 of the Act) on observing signs or receiving intelligence relating to modern slavery. The public authority (including schools) bears this obligation where it has 'reasonable grounds to believe that a person may be a victim of slavery or human trafficking'.

• Staff must be aware of the above and contact the DSL should they suspect or receive information that either parents or their children may be victims of modern slavery. The DSL should then contact the NCA

<u>Peer on Peer Abuse</u> occurs when a young person is exploited, bullied and / or harmed by their peers who are the same or similar age; everyone directly involved in peer on peer abuse is under the age of 18.

This is most likely to include, but may not be limited to:

• bullying (including cyberbullying);

<ul> <li>physical abuse such as hitting, kicking, shaking, biting, hair pulling, or otherwise causing physical harm;</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>sexual violence and sexual harassment;</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>sexting (also known as youth produced sexual imagery); and</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>initiation/hazing type violence and rituals.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>ALL staff and volunteers understand that children can abuse other children</li> <li>ALL staff and volunteers will inform the DSL of suspected peer abuse and record in line with schools recording policy</li> <li>Peer on peer abuse will be taken as seriously as any other form of abuse</li> <li>All staff understand that abuse is abuse and should never be tolerated or passed off as "banter", "just having a laugh" or "part of growing up</li> <li>All staff will understand that pupils with SEND are more prone to peer group isolation and school will have extra pastoral support to address this.</li> <li>Physical abuse between peers will be managed under the school's <u>Behaviour</u> <u>Policy</u></li> <li>Emotional abuse between peers will be managed under the school's <u>Anti- Bullying Policy</u></li> <li>Harmful sexual behaviour will be identified and managed using the <u>Brook Traffic Light Tool</u> and with support and guidance from LCC Schools Safeguarding Officer</li> <li>Sexting will be managed on a case by case basis using national and local guidance and advice from LCC Schools Safeguarding Officer – Link to Government Sexting Guidance</li> <li>In cases of suspected or actual peer on peer abuse a risk assessment will be undertaken and appropriate and proportionate control measures put in place to manage and reduce risk. Seek advice from LCC Schools Safeguarding Officer</li> <li>Referrals to Children's Social Care, Police and/or other appropriate agencies will be made where thresholds are met</li> <li>DSLs understand that regarding peer on peer abuse, the victim and the perpetrator are likely to have unmet needs and require support and assessment to determine these.</li> <li>The DSL will consider:</li> <li>The DSL will consider:</li> <li>the wishes of the victim in terms of how they want to proceed</li> <li>the nature of the alleged incident</li> <li>the ages of the children involved</li> <li>any power imbalance between the children</li> <li>is the incident a one-off or a sustained pattern of abuse</li> </ul>
