#### Subject Aims

- develop awareness and understanding of musical traditions, styles and cultures from other times and places;
- foster enjoyment of all aspects of music.

#### Subject Vision

At Silverdale St John's, we ensure that pupils develop and practise musical skills and concepts in a progressive way. We encourage our pupils to play instruments, sing and compose with enthusiasm while developing confidence and a love of music. Our music sessions are hands-on, engaging and creative. Our pupils are actively involved in musical performances throughout the year, sharing their talents and joy for music with parents and members of the community.
